building a future community

As I reflect on the life of the School in 2018 and look ahead to the promise of the New Year in 2019, as a school community we have much for which to give thanks. It is a pleasure to work in a school with such strong heart and conviction of purpose for our students. We are blessed with stunning grounds and facilities that inspire and we have a highly committed team of staff who genuinely care for our students and build positive relationships to support their learning and overall development.

The first year of the extension of co-education into the Senior School in 2018 has been a great success with the feature being how well the students embraced the change. We welcomed 50 female students into the Senior School in Years 7, 8 and 11 and in 2019 we look forward to this number growing to 115, with girls enrolled in all year levels in the School.

The School has a proud history in boarding stemming back to its Foundation in the late 1800s, when girls and boys resided at Woodbridge House. A key factor in our decision to extend co-education into the Senior School was the opportunity to provide exceptional quality co-educational boarding for families in Perth.

Strong community and family connections lie at the heart of boarding at Guildford Grammar School and we are excited that from the beginning of 2020 brothers and sisters will be able to live and be educated together. One school, one pick-up and drop-off, and one schedule of school events will no doubt be an advantage for families and will further strengthen this connection.

We have recently released the designs of our new world class, state-of-the-art co-educational boarding development that have been submitted for Development Application approval, with the new facility to be ready by the beginning of 2021. The

development includes separate secure living areas for girls and boys, with both single sex and co-educational social lounges. The new facility has been designed to accommodate approximately 200 boarders.

The development incorporates flexible meeting rooms and lounges, study spaces, media lounges, kitchen facilities, a parent lounge, office spaces, staff accommodation and medical facilities. The proposed location of the development on the northern side of Terrace Road provides additional security and stunning views across to the Swan River.

For the start of co-educational boarding in 2020, our female boarders will be accommodated downstairs in the current Junior Hall of residence in their own separate secure wing along with a female staff member. This will enable them to be fully integrated into the life of the boarding community prior to the completion of the new development.

The plans for the new Boarding Development will not be able to be fully realised without the support of the Foundation and broader philanthropic support from the community.

Information will soon be available to all members of the community on how you can support the School and the Foundation to enable this transformational project to be completed.

Another key strategic focus area for the School is the social and emotional well-being (SEW) of our community. We now have two years of SEW student data that is informing initiatives and identifying trends. It was most pleasing to note a significant positive lift in the overall SEW levels for Senior School students in 2018, especially as it was the first year of co-education. We also measured the SEW for our staff in 2018 and will this year look to implement an SEW survey for

certain Old Guildfordian groups, in order to get an idea of how our alumni are faring collectively in life post-school. If we are to be true to our purpose then it is essential that we are interested and informed about how our students are travelling in life beyond the school gates.

I trust that as usual you will enjoy reading the pages of this edition of the Forward, which once again highlight the extensive array of opportunities available to our students and their fine achievements.

I look forward to meeting many parents and Old Guildfordians during the year through the range of regional and overseas events we have planned. No doubt a particular highlight will be the Old Guildfordian dinner in Kuala Lumpur on 20 April that coincides with the Music Tour to Malaysia.

A special place at the Preparatory School

If you were to visit what was the reception area in the Preparatory School in the past you will discover that it has a very new purpose. The reception desk has been removed, the room painted and enclosed more with an altar placed in the centre, surrounded by a ring of chairs against the wall.

The space is now called an "Oratory" which might be defined as a small chapel, especially for private worship. In the life of the Preparatory School it also acts as a special place, a place set aside as a reminder of the workings of the Divine in our lives, our work and in the Preparatory School.

The candle-holders were very kindly, generously and lovingly made by Mr Peter Benzie, Assistant Head of the Senior School.

Speaking at that service in which the "fruits of his labour" were blessed for the

work of the Church and building up of the Kingdom of God in the Preparatory School, Mr Benzie spoke of his delight in being able to use his gifts and skills in woodwork to make something very beautiful and thereby enrich other people's lives. He encouraged the students to ensure that they used their God given gifts as best they could; not only

because that was the correct thing to do, but because it would give them a great deal of personal pleasure and satisfaction.



For the contributions everyone makes to enhance our prayer life and worship, be it in the Chapel of St Mary and St George, at Priestley Hall, or our delightful Oratory, we give thanks to God.

Congratulations to the **Class of**

We are pleased to report the WACE results achieved by the Guildford Grammar School students of 2018 and congratulate them on their fine academic achievements reflected in these results. We acknowledge the hard work invested by these students and their teachers, supported by their families and friends.

High academic achievement is a feature of our results, with 25 students (25% of those sitting four or more ATAR examinations) achieving an ATAR above 90, ranking their results in the top 10% nationally. Three of these students achieved an ATAR of 97.5 or more, placing them in the top 2.5% Australia-wide. They have the honour of entering Guildford Grammar School's Academic Honour Guild (previously known as the 400 club).

Our special congratulations go to **Jonathan Choong** who achieved an ATAR of 99.6 as well as to **Jack Stewart** (98.75) and **Simon McDowall** (98.35).

It is very pleasing to note that 60 students out of 101 (60% of Guildford Grammar School students who sat four or more examinations), were placed in the top 20% of the state using the ATAR as the measure.

11 members of the graduating class achieved entry to the Senior Academic Honour Society, which requires the impressive attainment of a minimum twelve A grades across the first eighteen months of Years 11 and 12. These students were:

STAFF PROFILE

Introducing **Andras Jo-Kovacs**

Sport Development Co-ordinator – Aquatics

You may have noticed a recent change to our Learn to Swim program and the swimming program in general across the School and Andras just might have something to do with that!

Andras Jo-Kovacs joined the School last year as the Sport Development Co-ordinator – Aquatics, and is responsible for all aspects of the School's aquatics program.

Andras has had an extensive career in aquatic sports, including eight years as a professional water polo athlete in Hungary. He has coached at school, state, national and international levels.

Before coming to Guildford Grammar School, Andras worked at the Western Australian Institute of Sports (WAIS) in the men's water polo program, with responsibility for swimming and the technical aspects of water

polo. From 2014-2018 he was invited to be the assistant coach of the Australian Youth National Men's Team and prepared the squad for international events, including the World Championships earlier last year.

Andras is himself an accomplished swimmer, first entering the pool at 4 years of age. He is a professional water polo player and represented Hungary in the sport. One of his personal role models is Katinka Hosszu, a Hungarian swimmer who just earned her 400th medal in international swimming.

"2018 was an exciting year at Guildford Grammar School and I am very pleased to have been part of it. The opportunity to broaden the scope of the existing swimming program and work on building an inclusive aquatic culture for the school really appealed to me. I plan to develop a culture where

everyone can be passionate about water sports, whatever their motivation.

We have already reinvigorated the Learn to Swim program, which started on 15 October, and we recently launched the Swim @ GGS program across the Senior School. We will continue to focus on the quality of our coaches to ensure our programs allow for personal excellence at all levels."





Blankets by Boys

Helping young people in need



A Year 9 student and his brother have created a program to help young people living rough on the streets. Year 9 student Alexander explains more about the program and how members of community can become involved.

Blankets by Boys is an initiative created by brothers who want to help those in need. We began after visiting a Perth restaurant in December 2017 and noticed many struggling young people. These street-children were given food to help them survive but what they really needed was something warm for wintertime. With our parents encouragement we decided to knit 20cm x 20cm squares to make up blankets to donate to the homeless. We weren't fast enough, even though the entire family was knitting daily, so we came up with the idea of placing boxes in retirement homes and medical centres so that they might make some squares for us. It was a huge success and so our Mum created a Facebook page for us.

From the Facebook page we received many calls and messages. All kinds of people became involved - girls groups, the Ellenbrook Senior Socials, Real Estate agencies, Medical Centres and schools. The instructions on the boxes we distributed were quite clear - while you are waiting for your appointment just knit a few lines! We even have an 82-year-old gran who knits beanies for us!

Once we had the Facebook page up and running the community became very supportive and bags of blankets, pillows, socks and beanies were delivered to our home on a daily basis. We gave some to StreetConnect, associated with Anglicare, but we still had so many more blankets to hand out. We found Perth Homeless Support

Group and began volunteering with them and every week we would go and distribute the items.

The nicest part of the project is talking to the people we meet during these visits and some of their stories inspired us even more. We met a young man who was very nicely dressed and very smart and he told us that the city was helpful in terms of where you could clean-up and shower. He said he was homeless but could always be clean, he said

socks were the most important item to him and many others. Another young person slept on the street at night and got food from various places and went to TAFE during the day. One of the most memorable stories was from a young girl, who called herself Michael. I knew straight away that she only said she was a boy as she felt safer on the streets that way. I will always remember how happy she was even though life was not easy. We found these people to be very grateful because we spoke to them, greeted them and shook hands.

After a few visits, we noticed the homeless wished that they could take many more items with them, but the problem was how to carry them. That's where the idea came from to collect suitcases on wheels, so they can pack their stuff into them and move around easily. I knew that I couldn't do this by myself, I needed help, so I asked my school for some help.

We advertised in the School's weekly Bulletin and on their social media pages for families to donate any suitcase on wheels that they were not using. Four weeks later I collected all the bags - a total of 58 bags, from suitcases to backpacks and handbags. Volunteering the following week we gave out the bags, but the problem was that there were 150 homeless people lining up. We needed more. I returned to school and thanked everyone on social media. In the future, we plan to collect more.

We are always looking for suitcases (preferably on wheels); backpacks, beanies, scarves, socks, blankets, the squares to make up blankets, wool, thick knitting needles, torches, even old mobile phones (with phone cards).

Public Speaking

Guildford Grammar School's values

are alive and well in our public speaking team. 2018 was another year in which our students represented the School with both skill and passion. What has been even more impressive is the respect and genuine interest in important social issues that these students have demonstrated when participating across Perth communities. Students attended a variety of competitions over the year. Some, such as the UN Evatt competition, are through their HASS subjects, as well as extra-curricular clubs and groups.

Zachary Matthews (11Fr) has continued to lead the way with his involvement in the UN Evatt Competition. Zachary, in conjunction with **Emerson Varris** (11He), **Marcus Outram** (11Fr) and **Abigail Burbridge** (11Be) represented our School in a mock sitting of the United Nations Security Council. This is a very challenging competition in which students present solutions to real world international problems. Our students represented their nation's interests very well, having much influence on the chamber and on the resolution itself, with both teams proposing some very effective, instrumental amendments. The competition was stiff this year and unfortunately this meant neither Guildford delegation was able to make it through to nationals. Though neither delegation continued, the efforts

made were highly commendable, as getting through to the States meant we were in the top 15 out of 138 delegations. Congratulations to the teams. At the time of writing, other students such as **Lachlan Bella** (11Ha), **Stuart Boyd** (9Wb) and **William Hutson** (9Sc) are also preparing for the junior UN Evatt competition.



Dr Harris on the China Tour

In Term 3 last year, I was lucky enough to be successful in my application for an eight day study tour to China, organised by the Confucius Institute through AISWA, to take place during the September holidays.

It was with some trepidation that I set off from Perth airport with fifteen or so other educational leaders to Beijing, Shanghai and Hangzhou, having not travelled extensively in Asia before. I had been told various things including that it would be very different from India and that it would be culturally fascinating. This was indeed true – I had travelled to India a couple of times previously and China was very different. I was impressed at the cleanliness of the streets and the seemingly lovely lives that very old people enjoyed. I was surprised at how few people spoke or understood English but not surprised that my French, German and Welsh skills were entirely useless. I struggled with the ubiquitous smoking inside buildings (at the university, in restaurants, inside the hotel) and marvelled at the vast numbers of tower blocks of flats in which people lived.

We enjoyed visits to various schools as well as to various touristy venues. The Great Wall of China was far bigger than I had imagined and teeming with thousands of people, many of whom embarrassed me by taking selfies with me because they'd never seen anyone with white hair before. I blushed at the thought of the captions they would add to their photos of the strange, pale foreigner they encountered that day. Tiananmen Square was an emotional visit for me, as I recalled the man with the shopping bags who stopped the tanks on that dreadful day and wondered again what happened to him subsequently. It was interesting to witness the numerous photographs and lengthy speeches that happened at every destination and on every occasion. I returned far more aware of Chinese cultural norms and much more able to effectively understand some of the differences in approach between our cultures, which will undoubtedly be useful.

the next round. In the next stage we were titrating individually, and our results would be accumulated, contrary to the initial competition.

So it was back to Mrs Macdonald's room, titrating again for weeks, perfecting our skills and individually completing two titrations and making up our own solutions. At first it was daunting but closer to the competition we knew we were ready.

The three teams were confident as we arrived at Murdoch University on 29 August, after enjoying the traditional pre-competition HJ's run. After calculating our results, we submitted them as a group and we were each told whether we achieved a silver or gold medallion. We were ecstatic to find that our results ranked our three teams 4th, 3rd and 2nd consecutively, with all three teams gaining an 'Excellent Team' status. The results were as follows:

Hard work and commitment pays off in the pool for Emily

Year 8 student Emily Nayler progressed rapidly through swimming competition ranks last year, taking home five gold medals at the Winter State Championships.

Starting at the 2018 summer State competition where Emily took home two silver medals in the 100m and 200m breast stroke, her swimming has gone from strength to strength and Emily qualified to compete for WA at the Australian Age Swimming Championships in Sydney in October 2018.

Emily competed in two finals at the Australian Age Swimming Championships in Sydney during April and came back ranked number 1 in WA for all the 13-year-old breaststroke events. As a result of these performances she was identified for the Swimming WA Performance Pathway Programs for 2018/19.

At the recent Winter State Championships, Emily won five gold medals in 50m, 100m, 200m Breaststroke, 200m and 400m Individual Medley as well as a bronze with her team mates in a relay. As a result she was chosen to represent WA at the Australian Age Swimming Championships in Sydney in October. She competed in the 13-14 year old category, as a 13 year old, achieving personal bests in all of her races and finishing 7th in the 200m breaststroke, 14th in the 400m individual medley, 11th in the 50m breaststroke and 12th in the 100m breaststroke.

Emily swam her first breaststroke race in her school swimming carnival at the age of 8. A member of her local swimming club suggested that she compete in the Dive and Try competition and



she has loved swimming ever since. She has trained competitively for the past two and a half years with the Guildford Kalamunda Districts Swimming Club.

Early starts are no problems for Emily, training seven times a week, including three dry land sessions. She also swims on Friday afternoons as part of her development sport for school.

"I have a lot of self-discipline! My normal routine after school is training, dinner, homework and bed. On Tuesdays and Thursdays I know I have a 4.00am start, so I need to be very organised. I don't have a lot of time on devices or watching TV during the week. When I have a weekend competition I have to prepare ahead and do that week's homework, prepare for the week and swim. I know that to be successful I must work hard in swimming and at school."

Emily's long term goal is to make the Australian team. Her short term goals include achieving top 5 at the Nationals for 100 or 200 breaststroke and qualifying for the Open Nationals.

Alongside a newly branded and reinvigorated Learn to Swim program, heating of the Senior School pool and the refurbishment of the Preparatory School pool, we will be introducing additional opportunities for students across the school.

Aquatic environments are a quintessential part of the Australian way of life. Beaches, lakes, rivers and backyard pools are ever present in our environment. Being a confident swimmer allows us to be safe, have fun and achieve personal excellence in our water based activity of choice.

We have designed and modified our program to welcome students to our pool, irrespective of their motivation to swim and increased the flexibility of our approach.

For students whose drive for personal excellence is in long and short course performance, we will continue to provide appropriate extension, technical development and pathways, enhanced through our relationship with the Guildford and Kalamunda Districts Swimming Club. We are also encouraging our confident swimmers to represent the school in Open Water Swimming and Aquathons to broaden their competitive opportunities.

For those motivated by being part of an 'all-of-school' team, who want to swim 'for House' and 'for School', we will be strengthening our team swimming culture and working to increase our depth. In 2020, we will begin to target mixed events and part of this cultural change is to embed these opportunities for both our boys and girls.

We encourage all students who have previously represented their House and School, or those who would like to try, to come to the pool and be part of building something bigger and better. For us to do this well requires an all of school push, which means our basketballers, rowers, tennis players, athletes, cricketers and netballers coming along as often as they can. More frequent session times, in both mornings and afternoons, allow for students to manage their schedules.

Our water polo players and triathletes, alongside their sport specific skill sessions, have flexible opportunities to do a variety of swimming-based cardio and water-based strength work. Their inclusion under the aquatics umbrella adds to the diversity of goals within the program and increases our numbers and provides a positive effect on the social environment - more people in the water, more fun!

For our athletes, swimming is a low impact way to improve cardiovascular fitness, as



part of a balanced strength and conditioning program. Swimming also supports the development of life and water safety skills and for those interested to give back to our communities patrolling our beaches with Surf Lifesaving.

For some of our students their motivation is more personal: they use swimming to help manage mental health, to improve well-being, to sleep better, for stress relief, for friendships, fun or fitness.

Brothers lifting above their weight

Brothers Rourke and Lachlan Turton are both seasoned weightlifters, competing on a regular basis in local and state competitions.

At the 2018 U15 & Youth State Championships, Rourke competed in the 77kg weight category and obtained two personal bests, with an 80kg snatch and a 100kg clean & jerk, and a total of 180kg, which won him the youth silver medal. Lachlan competed in the 46kg weight category obtaining two personal bests, with a 33kg snatch and a 45kg clean & jerk, breaking his own state record. He had a total of 78kg, winning gold in the under-15 46kg weight category and gold in the youth 46kg weight category.

As a result of their efforts, both Rourke and Lachlan were invited to be on the WA State U/15 and Youth Weightlifting team to compete at the Nationals in July, competing in three WA State team squad training sessions prior to the event.

In the last week of Term 2, Rourke was called up at short notice for the Oceania Australian Youth Male team. The AWF asked him to fly to Noumea, New Caledonia, and represent Australia in the 85kg body weight category. On Friday 29 June he not only managed to successfully get an 82kg snatch and 93kg clean and jerk on the board, thereby earning points for the team, but he also



won the bronze medal for Australia, which contributed to Australia winning the youth male team trophy.

The 2018 AWF National U/15 & Youth Weightlifting Competition was held at Guildford Grammar School on 7 and 8 July 2018. Lachlan competed in the 50kg bodyweight category representing WA, and with a snatch of 36kg and a clean & jerk of 47kg, he achieved fourth place. Rourke competed in the 85kg bodyweight category representing WA, and with a snatch of 86kg

and a clean & jerk of 100kg, he won the bronze medal for WA.

Rourke competed again on Sunday 15 July in the State Senior & Junior Weightlifting Championships in the 85kg bodyweight category, and with an 80kg snatch and a 100kg clean & jerk he won the gold medal in the junior section. As a result, he was selected to be in the junior state team bound for Brisbane in early September, but chose to decline the offer on advice from his coach.

Distributions to the school community and operating accounts to support sub-committee planned events totalled \$90,418.60 in 2018.

The process of P&F funding assessment and ratification is robust and requires the Committee to ensure all funding applications fit with the strategic pillars of the P&F and demonstrate a fair and reasonable distribution across all school areas. The Strategic Pillars (equal weighting) are:

- Support school
- Support parents
- Foster goodwill
- Social exchange
- Cultural initiatives
- Sports
- Arts

The Committee commences the process of identifying and assessing funding applications in the first quarter of the calendar year with the aim of ratifying funding in May and monies expended by the AGM.

In 2018 the Committee introduced a new and improved system which has formalised the funding request process through an





on-line form that is submitted to the School and must pass through either the Head of Senior School or Head of Preparatory School to ensure no overlap in funding between the school and the P&F; and as another vetting and transparency step in the process.

Old Guildfordian of the Year 2018

Dr Michael Gannon

There is no doubt we can be very proud of the many Old Guildfordians around the globe that are productive members of their community and are doing astonishing things. One such Old Guildfordian is Dr Michael Gannon, a renowned Obstetrician and Gynaecologist who was the President of the Australian Association (AMA) from 2016 to 2018. At last year's Old Guildfordians' Annual Dinner on 6 October, 200 former students and staff celebrated Michael's achievements and applauded his selection as the 2018 'Old Guildfordian of the Year'.

An outstanding advocate for the medical profession, Michael is the Head of Department, Obstetrics and Gynaecology, at St John of God Subiaco Hospital. Specialising in medical problems in pregnancy, Michael works in the Perinatal Loss Service at King Edward Memorial Hospital and sits on the WA Perinatal and Infant Mortality Committee. A Graduate of the Australian Institute of Company Directors (GAICD), Michael is also a Board Member of MDA National Insurance. Before taking on the AMA national presidency, Michael was President of AMA WA from 2014 to 2016, while at the same time he was Chair of the Federal AMA Ethics & Medicolegal Committee.

In receiving the award, Michael said, "the reason this award is so special to me is because this school is so special to me". There is no doubt that Michael has considerable history with the School and is enjoying a near-continuous 36-year association. He married his wife, Mariam, in the School Chapel in 2003 and their son, **Patrick**, has just started Year 6 at the Preparatory School. Joining Michael at the Annual Dinner to share in his recognition were brothers **Richard** (Ha 1984-1989) and **Brad** (Wb 1986-1993), as well as their father **Martin**, a former fellow of Council (1988-1994). The relationship continues to be a family affair with Michael's cousin, **Sean Mordaunt** (Ha 1982-1987), having attended the School and his nephew, **Brendan Gannon**, starting Year 7 this year.

With his long list of significant achievements, Michael could be forgiven for allowing a little hubris to creep in. However, in his speech the opposite was true with Michael expressing tremendous gratitude for what life had given him. In humble tones Michael said, "I have led a fortunate life. So many of us have. Not just being educated at this school, but even just growing up in Perth in the '70s and '80s". Joined at the Annual Dinner by two tables from the Class of 1988, Michael expressed gratitude for the many "friendships and relationships that endure to this day". Michael spoke fondly of what lessons the School had taught him beyond the classroom, including integrity with a strong a moral compass, the importance of engagement and participation with the world around us, and the value of inspiration and competitive spirit.

In sharing a darker time in his past when he faced adversity, Michael described how, as a young man, he was caught up as a pawn in a power-play involving senior figures at King Edward Memorial

Hospital. He had to make an eight-hour appearance on the witness stand in the State Coroner's Court and Michael's career was very much under threat before it had even begun. In speaking candidly, Michael wondered where he had learnt the resilience to survive that time. Was it just dogged determination or from being taught right from wrong at school. What he will never forget is the people who supported him during those difficult times, including relationships he had forged as a student.

Speaking out on issues faced by the Country, Michael feels we need to do more in educating Australians on how to have a healthier relationship with alcohol and to eradicate a detrimental binge-drinking culture. He also feels Australia can do better on aged care, Aboriginal health, diversity, on the prevention of tobacco and e-cigarette consumption, and that we need to take better care of the environment.

Michael was glowing of the School's decision to extend co-education into the Senior School. He isn't certain that he left GGS in the '80s "armed with the skills necessary for relationships with girls and women". He added that he is optimistic about the future of our School. "Again it is leading. Going forward," and that a fully co-educational campus "shows us at our best, embracing diversity".

Taking the opportunity to talk further about diversity, Michael shared his opinion that diversity is not just about the colour of someone's skin, their gender or sexual orientation. In Michael's mind, diversity is more about listening to other people's thinking, other people's ideas. It was one of Michael's Medical School lecturers who he first heard say, "You are born with one mouth and two ears – use them in that ratio", adding that "when someone else is talking, you have a better chance of learning something you don't already know".

In closing and before proposing a toast to the School, Michael said, "this is a great school. That is why this is such a great honour. I will never forget it". We thank you Michael for championing causes such as the Nation's health, of diversity and of course the School. Congratulations on being our Old Guildfordian of the Year.

Passing of the Patron: VALE The Hon. **John Wickham QC**

It was with great sadness that the School's community said goodbye to The Honourable John Wickham QC, who died peacefully in his sleep on 24 September 2018 at age 99 years.



John was a passionate Old Guildfordian with a long and distinguished relationship with the School. As a student he was a School Prefect, Captain of St George's House and Captain of the Shooting Team. In later life his extraordinary service continued when he became a Fellow of School Council and then he took the chair from 1956-1959, all of which saw him become an Honorary Fellow of School Council. His commitment extended to The Old Guildfordians Association, where John was President from 1947-1948, being later elected as an Honorary Life Member and then becoming Patron of the Association from 2004, a position he held until his death.

In his professional life, John was a Justice of the Supreme Court of Western Australia from 1969-1983. Murdoch University also benefited from John's dedication to education when he was Chancellor from 1974-1980.

While it is difficult to say farewell to such a committed and distinguished individual, we thank you John for your devotion to the broader community of Guildford Grammar School.

Giant battle to the AFL

Zac Langdon (He 2011-2012)

At 22-years-old at the time, and being classified as a ‘mature-age recruit’, Old Guildfordian **Zac Langdon** knew he was potentially making a last chance attempt at achieving his dream of playing in the Australian Football League (AFL). Having arguably put in considerably more ground work than most AFL draft hopefuls, Zac was still to be confronted with a moment of anguish for his partner Eli, that would see him nearly pull out of the draft race entirely. With the 2018 AFL season now at an end, the story of Zac’s debut season with the GWS Giants tells a tale of hard work, determination and success for both himself and his partner Eli.

Growing up in the coastal town of Dampier, Zac approached his parents at the end of Year 10 with the notion of moving to Perth to attend Guildford Grammar School as a boarding student, all in hope of expanding his educational and sporting horizons. From the outset, Zac worked to achieve his initial goal of playing in the 1st XVIII, which he achieved in 2012. At the completion of his studies, Zac moved back to Dampier to take up a trade as an electrical apprentice with Rio Tinto. He returned to his local football club, the Dampier Sharks, and managed to win the League’s Best and Fairest award. But Zac’s return to his hometown would only be temporary, as two years into his apprenticeship he again floated the idea to his parents of moving back to Perth, this time to purely pursue his footballing interests. He took six months’ leave from his apprenticeship to join Claremont Football Club in the West Australian Football League (WAFL). From that point it became clear that he wasn’t going to return to Dampier, instead opting to juggle the demands of his trade and WAFL football for two years, all in the hope of getting drafted.

Behind the scenes, Zac’s long-term girlfriend Eli Suleska was facing a battle of her own.

As a powerful small-forward for the Claremont Tigers, Zac began by working hard through the pre-seasons and in the reserves side, battling to earn his league position. After two years he had managed 25 league games and a Premiership win with the reserves side, putting together a strong body of work in the WAFL. Moving toward the end of 2017, Zac was now in contact with a number of AFL clubs ahead of the AFL National Draft.

In September 2017 and with Pick 56 in the AFL National Draft, Zac was rewarded for his hard work by being drafted to the GWS Giants. The first step of his AFL dream had come to fruition. But as Zac would later reveal to his GWS teammates before his AFL debut, the moment of being drafted was “bittersweet”.

Behind the scenes, Zac’s long-term girlfriend Eli Suleska was facing a battle of her own. She had been diagnosed with Hodgkin’s Lymphoma in the lead-up to the 2017 AFL Draft Combine. The news of diagnosis was “earth-shattering” and Zac grappled with the decision to move forward with the AFL Draft Combine.

As the couple revealed in an interview on Fox Footy’s ‘On the Mark’, it was the brave push and support from Eli that saw Zac use the opportunity of the AFL Draft Combine, being aware that as an older player, this might be the only chance for him to get drafted.

As Zac moved across the country to Sydney to begin his work with the GWS Giants, Eli was undergoing four bouts of chemotherapy. In the lead-up to Round 1 of the 2018 AFL season, Zac had been impressing with his first pre-season, putting in some encouraging performances in the JLT Community Series. Then in March 2018, Zac would receive the best news yet; Eli had beaten cancer.

He had kept Eli’s battle with cancer private from his new GWS teammates. But as he received the good news over the phone from Eli, he made the decision to open up to them and tell them about what the couple had been going through. The news was met with overwhelming support from the team, which was followed by the announcement that Zac would be making his AFL debut in Round 1, 2018 against the Western Bulldogs.

The rollercoaster of hard work, determination, strength and support in the face of devastating news had seen the pair come out the other side. Zac utilised his maturity and developed an elite fitness in order to quickly establish himself within the GWS playing group. His playing style has seen him deliver effective pressure as well as earn a few goals to his name. His ongoing effort saw him ranked fifth at GWS for tackles, with an elite average of 4.2 a game. His breakout performance came in Round 11, 2018 against the Adelaide Crows that earned him a nomination for goal-of-the-year. Overall, he managed 20 goals in 19 games from the 2018 home and away season.

Zac’s debut year with the GWS Giants was an overwhelming experience that has taken him all the way through to the AFL Finals series, a feat that few first-year players get to experience. With his foundation of determination to learn, work hard and perform at an elite level, and with an equally as strong partner by his side, Zac Langdon’s future within the AFL promises to be an exciting prospect.

Winner of Richmond's Best & Fairest award, the Jack Dyer medal, in 2015 and Premiership winner in 2017.
